Owl Be Moving Outside

Here at the Wildlife Education Center, we are committed to providing the best care possible for our animal ambassadors. One thing we're always happy to offer our critters is more space, whether that means taking the turtles outside in the summer to bask in the sun, letting the rabbits roam in their exercise area, or overhauling their living quarters. The happier they are, the happier we are.

We can integrate things into their homes like hiding spots, changing views, foraging opportunities, and novel items. We use an animal's natural behaviors (either through wild study of the species or knowledge of the individual) to decide how best to give them as many choices in their home as possible, because variety is the spice of life!

When preparing to create a new living space, we spend lots of time answering questions and figuring out how our end result should look and function. We want to make sure it meets the needs of the animal while still being manageable from a care perspective.



Thanks to generous grants through the Open Space Institute's Malcom Gordon Charitable Fund and Orange and Rockland Utilities Inc., we are able to construct a new outdoor enclosure for our Great Horned Owl. This, combined with donations from the public, has made possible a long-awaited upgrade. Beyond it being the first permanent outdoor exhibit at the Wildlife Education Center, it will quadruple the amount of space the owl has access to and provide many new opportunities for exploration.

The new enclosure is being constructed by Corners Limited in Kalamazoo, Michigan. Among many others, Corners Limited has created custom projects for organizations like the National Zoo, the San Diego Zoo, and the Chicago's Shedd Aquarium. If all goes according to plan, the habitat should be in place by the end of May, with its resident moving in around mid-June. We hope she'll acclimate well to this big transition and look forward to providing her a new, improved home.

Take a walk down city streets, in the countryside, along the Hudson River, or even along a beach on a remote island, and you'll notice something in common: plastics. Plastics are the most commonly littered items in the world and they are drowning our planet!

Our Great Horned Owl has lived in captivity since 1986 when she was hit by a car while hunting. It may surprise you to learn this kind of injury is common. Birds of prey are drawn to roads and highways by mice and other small mammals that come to eat food thrown from vehicles. While this is easy hunting, the reward is not without risk. As a vehicle approaches, the owl, who is more like an airplane than a helicopter, needs time and space to "take off." Without the needed "runway," she's likely to be hit; possibly causing injuries that leave her unreleasable even after rehabilitation. You can help birds of prey avoid this fate. Please do not dispose of food – even an apple core – on roads and highways!



Weekend Nature Programs




Join us for a series of interactive and engaging programs about science and nature. Programs may include a presentation, outdoor exploration on our grounds and a variety of other activities.




STORYWALKTM OPENING DAY
